Drake Philosophy 1899

Susan Glaspell is one of Drake's most notable alumni. A native of Davenport, she became one of the first woman reporters for the Des Moines Daily News after she graduated from Drake with her degree in Philosophy. Later she lived New York and Provincetown, became a best-selling novelist and a Pulitzer Prize-winning playwright. Much of her work centers on social and political issues that still strike a chord today. Her play Trifles is among the most anthologized and highly-regarded of American plays.
